
Homeschooling is legal in all 50 states.

Your child will thrive academically. Home-educated students typically score 15 to 30 percentile points above public-school students on standardized academic achievement tests. Home-educated students typically score above average on the SAT and ACT college admissions tests.



Your child will thrive socially. Research shows that the home-educated are doing well, typically above average, on measures of social, emotional, and psychological development. Homeschool students are regularly engaged in social and educational activities outside their homes like field trips, scouting, 4-H, political drives, church ministry, sports teams, and community volunteer work.



Your child will become a thriving adult. Research indicates that adults who were homeschooled as children participate in local community service more frequently than does the general population, and that they go to and succeed at college at an equal or higher rate than the general population.
