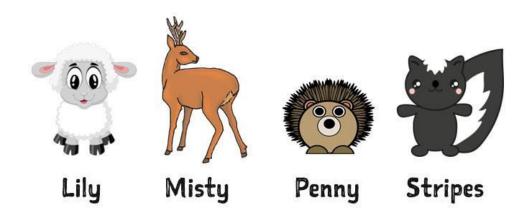
Oh my! Stripes likes Misty!
