Remembering Amy Carmichael

I would like to take you back in time to the year 1867 when one of my favorite historical missionaries was born on December 16th. Her name was Amy Carmichael, and she was born in Ireland. One of her famous quotes is, "You can give without loving, but you cannot love without giving." This is how she lived her life. She gave it all to God and to be obedient to his work. As she grew up, she heard a calling from God. After her dad died and several other events and missions, she ended up travelling to India where the biggest part of God's plan for her would take place. At first Amy did not want to leave her widowed mom to go on international missions although she felt God was calling her to. So, she wrote her mom. This is what she wrote and what her mom replied.

She wrote to her mother:

"I feel as if I had been stabbing someone I love - and through all the pain the certainty that it was His voice that I heard has never wavered... though I just feel one big ache all over; yet the certainty is there - He said to me "go" and I answered, "Yes Lord."

Amy's mother's reply is a lesson for all of us as parents:

"He has lent you to me all these years, so when he asks you now to go away from within my reach, can I say no? No, Amy - He is yours. You are His. I can trust you to Him - and I do."

Amy left for mission work, and that is what she did to the end. She never got married because she believed if she married, she would not be able to do God's work fully. In the end, God gave her a very large family and hundreds of children for her self-sacrifice in giving her all to His kingdom.

She lived and worked as a missionary in India from 1855. There she started to form a group called the "starry cluster" made up of three other Indian women. She preached the gospel of Christ to the people there, but one day a little girl named Preena ended up running into her. Preena was a temple child. Temple children are children who are freely given to the so called "gods" by their parents because the parents believed if they give their children to the "gods," in return the "gods" would give them material blessings. The little girls given to the temple were called "Deva Dasi." They were to be married to the "gods" of the temple and could never leave. Many bad things would happen to them there.

Preena managed to escape the temple once, but she was caught and her hands were branded with hot iron. Preena was determined to escape, and when she got the chance, she tried once again. This time, she ran into a kind woman from the village who took her to Amy's place. God worked ahead in ensuring that Amy was home and back from evangelizing that day, and that's how Preena came to meet Amy

Carmichael. This event changed the whole course of Amy's work in India. Amy Carmichael had compassion on Preena. Preena called Amy "Amah" which means mother in the Tamil language. Amy Carmichael withstood the pressure and threats from the temple workers who tried to get Preena back. Preena was given food, love, and a home by Amy.

This started Amy off on a new direction of rescuing other children in India from the temple. She would dye her skin with coffee and wear an India Sari (Indian dress) to disguise and blend in. Soon she had saved many girls from the temple. She even got international help and managed to put a stop to the Deva Dasi system in India and save many girls from being molested. India outlawed temple prostitution in 1948. Eventually, she opened an orphanage and founded a mission in Dohnavur, Tamil Nadu, India. This became a safe place for children of India as she rescued more and more. She served in India for 55 years until her death.

Amy Carmichael died in 1951 at age 83 years old. Amy had suffered most of her life from neuralgia. She is said to have died peacefully by her nurse who was with her. By the end of her life, she had written 35 books about her missionary work including poems. One of her poems which I like is called "For Our Children."

Father, hear us, we are praying,

Hear the words our hearts are saying;

We are praying for our children.

Keep them from the powers of evil,

From the secret, hidden peril;

Father, hear us for our children.

From the whirlpool that would suck them,

From the treacherous quicksand, pluck them;

Father, hear us for our children.

From the wordling's hollow gladness,

From the sting of faithless sadness,

Father, Father, keep our children.

Through life's troubled waters steer them;
Through life's bitter battle cheer them;
Father, Father, be Thou near them.

Read the language of our longing,
Read the wordless pleadings thronging,
Holy Father, for our children.

And wherever they may bide, Lead them Home at eventide.

I wanted to write about Amy Carmichael since my great ancestors were from India, and also I have a really good Christian friend in India. "Yes," said Newton.

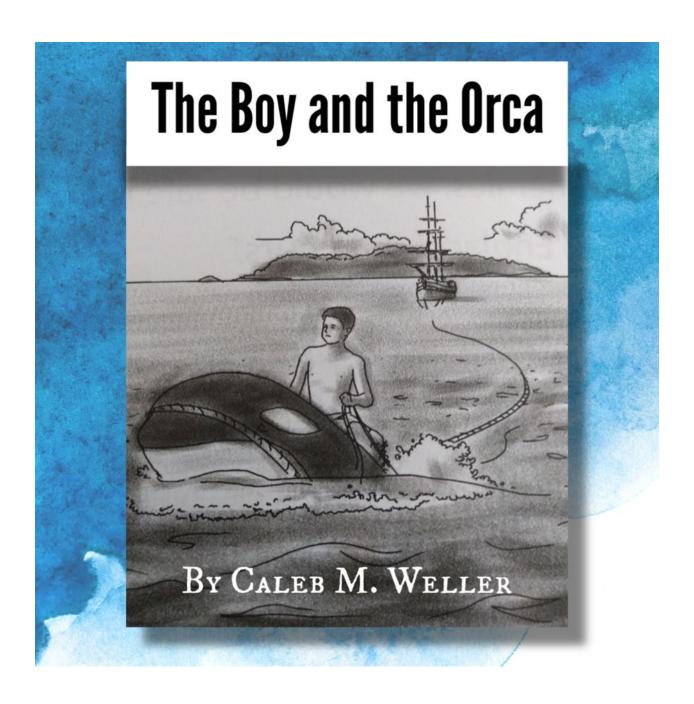
Victoria then carefully put the parchment back in her bag.
